# Reading & Writing Workshop During Remote Teaching

Literacy Components	Synchronous, Asynchronous, or Either	What this might look like online.	Teacher's Role	Students' Roles
Mini-Lesson	Either	Share a brief mini-lesson targeting an overarching skill either live on video or recorded. Screencastify, Loom, Screencastomatic are three common platforms for video recording mini-lessons. The benefit of recording mini-lessons is that students who need to replay the video can replay it as many times as they'd like.	Explicitly teaches a lesson to the group	Listen and participate
Read-Aloud	Either	Conduct a read-aloud either live on video or recorded and share with students. Screencastify, Loom, Screencastomatic are three common platforms for video recording read-alouds. The benefit of recording the read-aloud is that students who need to replay the video can replay it as many times as they'd like. While recorded read-alouds are nice for replay, live read-alouds on video with students offer opportunities for interaction. During the read-aloud, pause to think aloud, and provide students with opportunities to type a response into the Chat or in online journals. Create a shared Google Document for read-alouds and have students interact periodically during the reading.	Models reading	Listen and interact
Shared Reading	Synchronous	Have students meet online either in small groups or as a large group and view the same text. Share the screen or make a text available to each student. Commonly used text for shared reading are poems, picture books, books on platforms such as A-Z Reading, GetEpic.com, and other online platforms. Remind students to read together. Lead students in either choral or echo reading. As the class reads in unison, keep in mind that some students will not read. Some English learners may benefit from hearing their peers and listening until they are ready to participate.	Leads reading	Read along with the teacher

# Reading & Writing Workshop During Remote Teaching

Guided Reading	Synchronous	Schedule times to gather online with small groups. Many teachers meet with small groups for guided reading on platforms such as Zoom or Google Meet. Typically online guided reading lessons are flexible because students have varied access to resources. Some students will be reading from online platforms like GetEpic.com or A-Z Reading and others will have paper books either from the public library, school library, or home library.	Listens and guides readers	Read
Independent Reading	Asynchronous	Touch base frequently with English learners about their reading. What are they reading? Do they have access to books? Provide students with access to resources and support. Just as in face-to-face learning, remote independent reading takes up the majority of reading workshop. Flipgrid and Padlet are two technology tools that teachers have found to engage readers from afar. Students post videos or responses about the books they are reading and share with their peers. They can also view what their classmates are reading and make comments.	Confers with individual students or works with students in small groups	Read self-selected books on their own
Write-Aloud	Synchronous	Model your writing on a Google Document, a screen sharing platform, or on a chart or dry erase board as students watch virtually in real time. Think aloud and write simultaneously as students observe. Keep the lesson brief and remember to stop to allow students to talk. Have students chorally or echo read what has been written.	Models writing	Listen and participate
Shared Writing	Synchronous	Gather students online. Share a document with them using Google Docs or Google Slides. Lead students in writing together. Elicit student voice in writing. Encourage students to share ideas for writing and periodically pause to read the writing in unison.	Holds the pen	Dictate
Independent Writing	Asynchronous	Encourage students to write independently and on topics of their choice. Meet often to guide students and provide them with feedback about their writing. Two popular online writing platforms for writing are Bookcreator and WriteReader.	Confers with individual students or work with students in small groups	Write on a topic of their choice on their own
